


Where we came from & Where we are headed



Then and Now

1992

- 13 group homes supporting 64 people with autism spectrum disorder
- 3 day behavior management programs serving 120 people with autism spectrum disorder
- Group oriented Family Support services

2008

- 97 people living in their own homes with a variety of support configurations
- 143 people working, owning their own business, volunteering, and attending college
- 400 children & adolescents being supported in our family support program

Facts about Supported Living

- 97 people living in 96 homes of their own
- 8 people receive walk in support
- 89 people receive 24/7 support (variety of different support configurations)
- 48% of all housemates have lived with the same person for more then 9 years
- Housing/support are completely separate
- 50% of the people were once in state operated facilities

Employment

- No one is paid less then minimum wage
- Average monthly pay is \$940 monthly in Supported Employment (VR)
- Average monthly pay is \$467 in employment not paid for by Vocational Rehabilitation
- Average work week is 18 hours (SE) 12 hours (non VR)
- Range of traditional and non-traditional jobs
- 14 people involved in micro-enterprises
- Non work hours valued social roles

Then and Now

1992

2008

- Turn over in group living 105%
- Turn over in day program 60% - 70%
- Experience Mod at 244% (workers compensation
- Net worth \$88,500

- Turn over 27%
- Experience Mod 81%
- Net worth -\$1,940,450

Organizational Beliefs

- Leadership values, mission, philosophy & action
- Discovery & Exploration & Understanding
- Person-centered support (paid, unpaid, technology, neighbors and co-workers and the right match)
- How people show up in people's lives
- Circles of support
- Based practices that may include PBS, Sensory, Motor & Movement issues, PTSD, Flashbacks, Mental and Physical health issues, etc.)
- Listening, communication & honoring people's unique communication methods and styles
- High Expectations and ordinary life experiences
